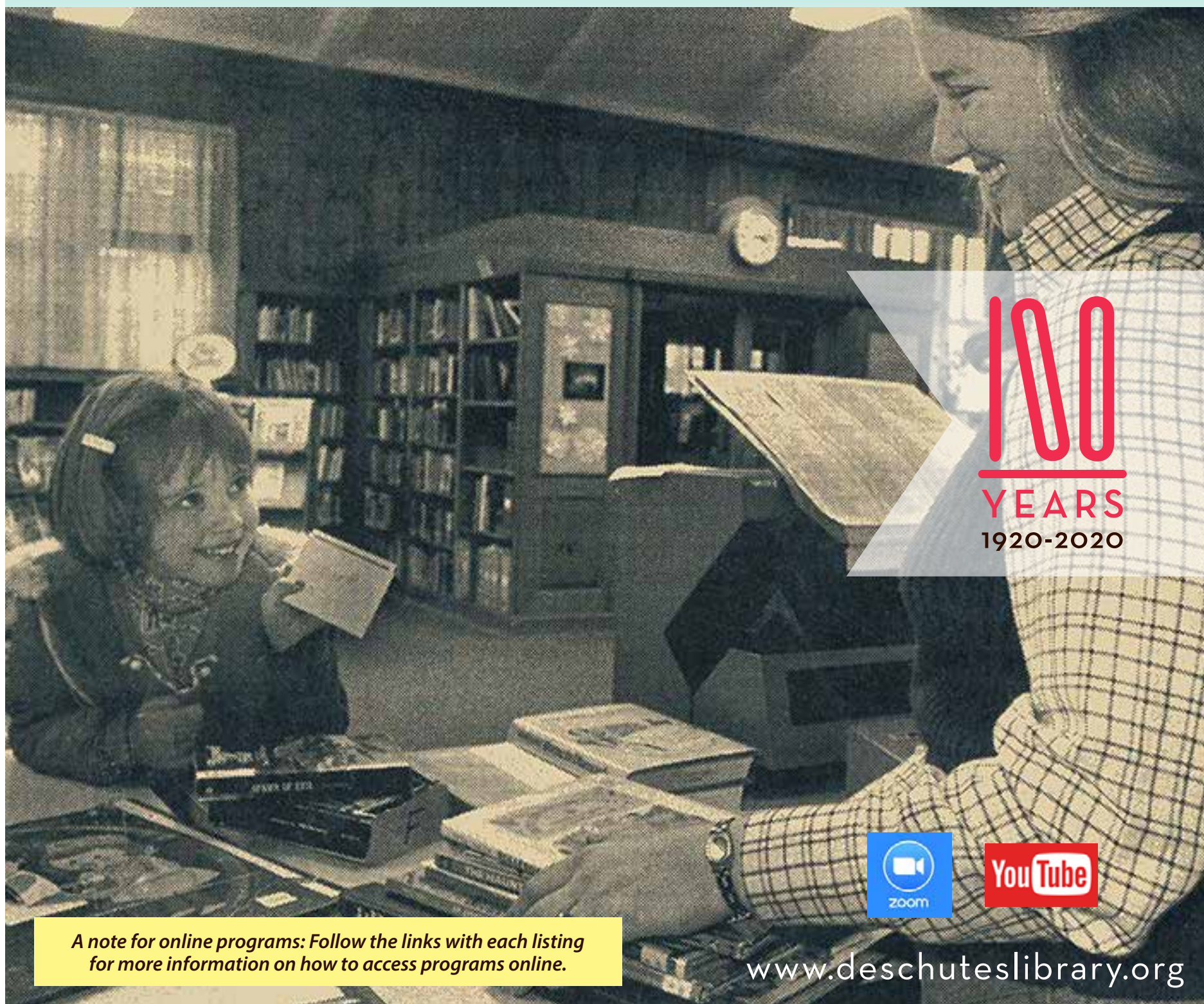

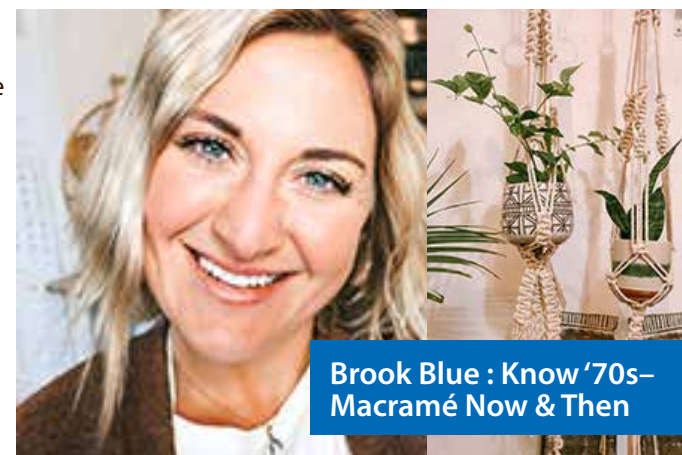

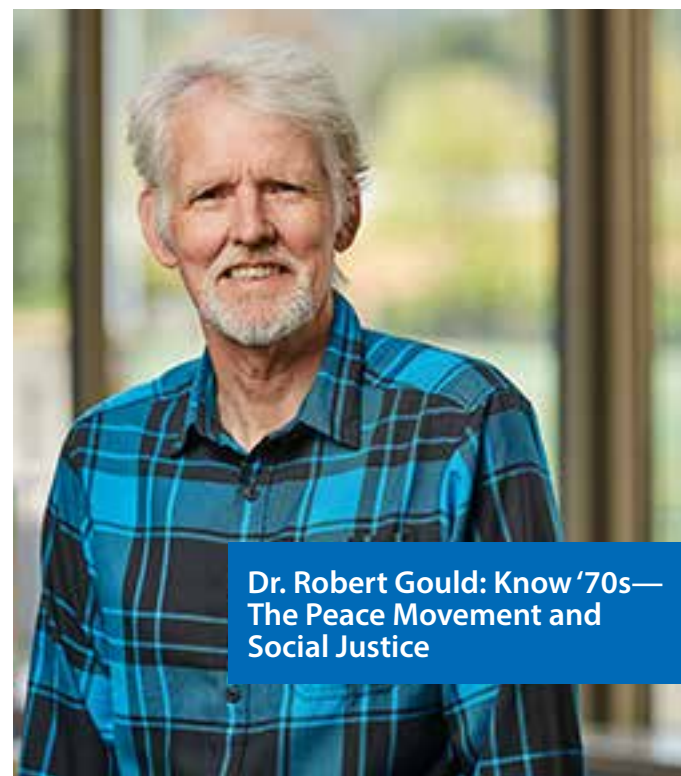
Know '70s: Groovy Books of the '70s
